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## What:

1. **Ordo Amoris Classical** (OAC) is a homeschool hybrid tutorial service that partners with parents. Parents are registered as homeschool families and work with OAC to provide tutoring for their children three days per week. Because OAC is a tutorial resource for homeschool families, parents are the primary educators and set the framework and tone for the student's entire education. We seek to partner with like-minded families to train up children in the way they should go. We understand that education is biblically the responsibility of the family. We work "in loco parentis," which is a Latin legal term meaning "in the place of the parents," to help provide academic discipline which will faithfully mature students in the nurture and admonition of the Lord.
2. We will meet three days together on Monday, Wednesday, and Thursday as a community of learners. There will be an attendance policy, uniform requirements, and academic preparation guidelines. Students will be placed in classes according to their demonstrated academic level. Parents will decide when their children graduate and will prepare their children's grade reports and transcripts, with guidance from the OAC tutorial staff as needed and desired.
3. Tuition for tutorial services will be set at \$3,600 for the 2019-2020 school year. Tuition is due by August 1 in the amount of \$1,200 with the remaining \$2,400 payable over the next eight months, September – April at installments of \$300 per month. Payments will be required to be made by automatic bank withdrawal (EFT) using a tuition collection system called TADs. Alternatively, families may pay the entire tuition balance in full by August 1 for a \$100 discount. Parents are responsible for all tuition payments even if a child is withdrawn mid-year. Curriculum and books are chosen by tutors and purchased by families and may be resold, reused, or kept.

## How:

1. **Classical Education:** This is an education that cares deeply for tradition and the education of the whole student. Academic subjects are taught alongside one another with an emphasis on primary texts and the liberal arts. Wisdom and virtue are the highest academic goals, the fruit of a complete and great education.
2. **Christian Education:** The purpose and practice of education starts and ends with the Triune God. The entire Church history, the breadth and depth of mankind, the impact of Judeo-Christian values on Western Civilization, all are studied under the Lordship of Christ. There is no subject, proposition, work of art, or vocation which can be separated from the glory of God. "Respect and obey the Lord! This is the beginning of wisdom. To have understanding, you must know the Holy God." Proverbs 9:10. This is our foundation.
3. **3-Day Model:** Students arrive at 7:45 AM Monday, Wednesday, and Thursday and the day begins in worship and wonder through singing and devotions. Students spend rigorous time in classes learning how to hone their virtues and define and defend their faith. We'll end the day at 3 PM. For the students' home days, tutors provide lesson plans and assignments. Parents are responsible to help manage studies and train their children to be independent and disciplined learners. Emphasis is placed on students having strong relationships and time for family.

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Behind the name “Ordo Amoris” and the Coat of Arms Shield:

Ordo Amoris is Latin for “Rightly Ordered Loves.” It first comes from St. Augustine when he wrote in the 5th century that *the “order of love” (ordo amoris) is the “brief and true definition of virtue.” (The City of God- St. Augustine of Hippo)*

C.S. Lewis included an analysis on Augustine’s idea of Ordo Amoris in his treatise on education, “The Abolition of Man.” In this work, he combines the philosophy of Aristotle with the Christian faith of St. Augustine to reveal the true object of education; **to help our children learn to love what they should love** (and hate what they should hate) according to the Word of God. The goal of this education is to have **rightly ordered affections**, to make good decisions based on a heart that is correctly aligned.

The Omega and Alpha in the top left of the shield are the last and first letters of the Greek Alphabet and the initial letters for Ordo Amoris. They speak to our vision: **To achieve the right end, you must start with the right beginning.**

The cross in the top right is a medieval version harkening back to a time “before education began to lose sight of its true object,” according to Dorothy Sayers.

The bottom section of the shield depicts a Phrygian cap on a Liberty Pole behind a sword. This has been a representation through history dating back to the Hellenistic Period in Greece. The Phrygian cap was popularized in Roman society as a garment worn by a freed slave. The cap became the inspiration for the French Revolution as a rejection of tyranny and was combined with the sword to become a symbol of freedom only through sacrifice. It became part of our Western Heritage and early American culture and can be found on many state seals as well as the United States Senate seal.

The symbol signifies this to us. We know our sword is the word of God and the truth contained therein. We know that truth gives us liberty, it sets us free. We are no longer slaves and also claim freedom for our children. This symbol is **the heart of why we train our children in the Classical Christian model; to understand where true freedom and the meaning of sacrifice and love can be found. Christ is the Cornerstone.**
